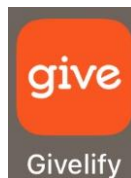

What We Believe

The Articles of Faith in the Baptist Church

I. The Scriptures. We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions shall be tried.

II. The True God. We believe the Scriptures teach that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

III. The Fall of Man. We believe the Scriptures teach that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgressions fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

IV. The Way of Salvation. We believe that the Scriptures teach that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Savior.

V. Justification. We believe the Scriptures teach that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

VI. The Freeness of Salvation. We believe that the Scriptures teach that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by cordial, penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own determined depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

VII. Regeneration. We believe that the Scriptures teach that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith, and newness of life.

VIII. Repentance and Faith. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our prophet, priest and king, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Savior.

IX. God's Purpose of Grace. We believe the Scriptures teach that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

X. Sanctification. We believe the Scriptures teach that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of his holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means especially the word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer.

XI. Perseverance of the Saints. We believe the Scriptures teach that such only are real believers as endure to the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

XII. The Law and Gospel. We believe the Scriptures teach that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arise entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible church.

XIII. A Gospel Church. We believe the Scriptures teach that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors, and Deacons whose Qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

XIV. Baptism and the Lord's Supper. We believe the Scriptures teach that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Savior, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

XV. The Christian Sabbath. We believe the Scriptures teach that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public, and by preparation for that rest that remained for the people of God.

XVI. Civil Government. We believe the Scriptures teach that civil government is of divine appointment, for the interest and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the Kings of the earth.

XVII. Righteous and Wicked. We believe the Scriptures teach that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

XVIII. The World to Come. We believe the Scriptures teach that the end of the world is approaching; that at the last day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave for final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

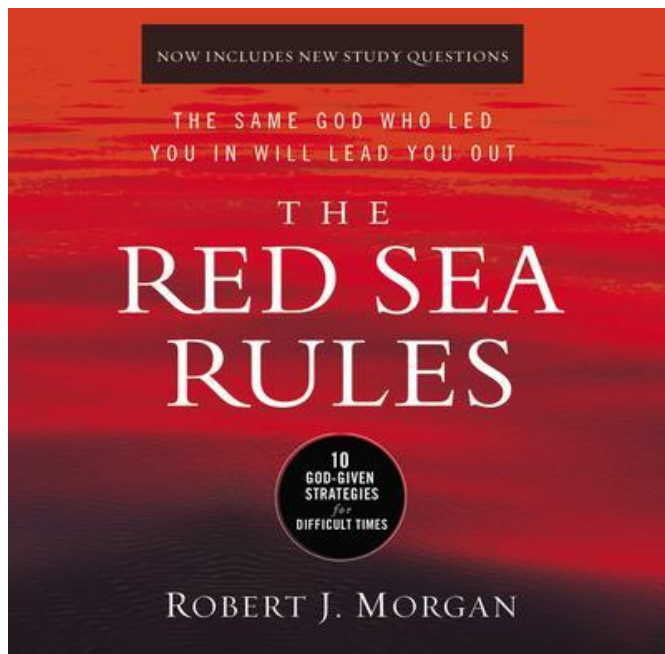
The Red Sea Rules: 10 God-Given Strategies for Difficult Times

World Day of Social Justice Day--February 20

Every year, the World Day of Social Justice is observed to emphasize the significance of promoting social justice by tackling problems including poverty, unemployment, exclusion, gender inequality, and human rights. It also examines potential remedies and advancements while bringing attention to global social injustice. It is a day to bring attention to social injustices, elevate the voices of the oppressed, and demand significant change. On this day, individuals, organizations, and governments can evaluate our progress toward social justice and identify areas that need work. World Day of Social Justice 2025 theme was “**Empowering Inclusion: Bridging Gaps of Social Justice,**” focusing on the importance of inclusive policies and social protection in managing systematic inequality. And, every year on February 20th, we commemorate the World Day of Social Justice.

The significance of World Day of Social Justice:

It is the concept behind the World Day of Social Justice celebration for all national and international policies should prioritize improving social justice. And, according to the United Nations (UN) website, supporters should promote decent work and a fair globalization agenda focused on fundamental human rights, employment opportunities, social protections, and constructive social dialogue between governments, employers, and workers to be the focus at putting social justice at the core of society.

Honoring Christ with Technology: Using Cybersecurity and Artificial Intelligence (AI) Wisely



A conservative Christian view of cybersecurity and AI begins with the truth that God is Creator and that human beings alone are made in His image. Technology is part of the world that God has given us to steward. Therefore, technology must remain a tool under the authority of Scripture, never a master. Cybersecurity supports clear biblical commands such as “Thou shalt not steal,” Exodus 20:15 (KJV), “... Provide things honest in the sight of all men,” Romans 12:17 (KJV), because it resists digital theft, fraud, and abuse in the same way that locks and ushers help protect the church building and its people.

AI must not be confused with a soul or a person, because it does not pray, repent, love, or trust Christ. It only imitates words, pictures, and patterns that people have placed into data and software. For that reason, Christians must ask how any use of AI affects holiness, family life, personal life, and the testimony of the church. Wise believers will ask very practical questions: Does this technology pull my heart away from devotion to Christ, or does it help me redeem the time? Does it protect children, young adults, and seniors, or expose them to temptation and deception?

A faithful response is not fear of every new device, but careful, prayerful use of technology that honors God and protects His people. In Wilmington, DE, and around the world, the Lord is continuing to speak to His church, “Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as doves,” Matthew 10:16 (KJV), in the digital age. Cybersecurity and AI can be used to strengthen the ministry, guard the flock, and carry the gospel, as long as they remain servants at the feet of Jesus and never rise to the level of an idol in the heart.

Created by a growing collective of professional historians, art historians, Black Studies scholars, and photographers and showcasing Getty Images' unmatched collection of photographs, Picturing Black History embraces the power of visual storytelling to relay little-known stories of oppression and resistance, perseverance and resilience, freedom, dreams, imagination, and joy within the United States and around the world.

First Born Girls: A Memoir by Bernice L. McFadden



On her second birthday in 1967, Bernice McFadden died in a car crash near Detroit, only to be resuscitated after her mother pulled her from the flaming wreckage. Firstborn Girls traces her remarkable life from that moment up to the publication of her first

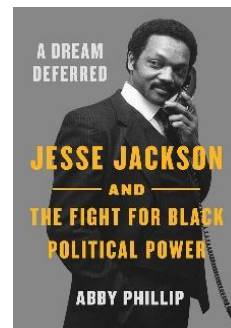
novel, Sugar.

Growing up in 1980s Brooklyn, Bernice finds solace in books, summer trips to Barbados, and boarding school to escape her alcoholic father. Discovering the works of Alice Walker and Toni Morrison, she finally sees herself and her loved ones reflected in their stories of "messy, beautiful, joyful Black people."

Interwoven with Bernice's personal journey is her family's history, beginning with her four-times enslaved great-grandmother Louisa Vacey Wilson in 1822 Hancock County, Georgia. Her descendants survived Reconstruction and Jim Crow, joined the Great Migration, and mourned Dr. King's assassination during the Civil Rights Movement. These women's wisdom, secrets, and fierce love are passed down like Louisa's handmade quilt.

A memoir of many threads, Firstborn Girls is an extraordinarily moving portrait of a life shaped by family, history, and the drive to be something more.

A Dream Deferred: Jesse Jackson and the Fight for Black Political Power by Abby Phillip



Jesse Jackson, the civil rights leader, activist, raconteur, and political candidate, finally gets a book worthy of his stature courtesy of CNN anchor Abby Phillip.

Focusing on his presidential runs in 1984 and, especially 1988, Phillip highlights how Jackson built an unlikely coalition that showed how Black political power

could be consolidated. His experience working under Martin Luther King; his organizing the SLCC's Operation Breadbasket in Chicago and beyond; and his roots in the deep South combined into two astonishingly impactful presidential campaigns. Appealing to the working people of urban enclaves like that of Chicago, young people on college campuses, and Black people across the South, he created the modern Democratic coalition—one that has been used by all major Democrats seeking national success from Obama to Biden to Harris.

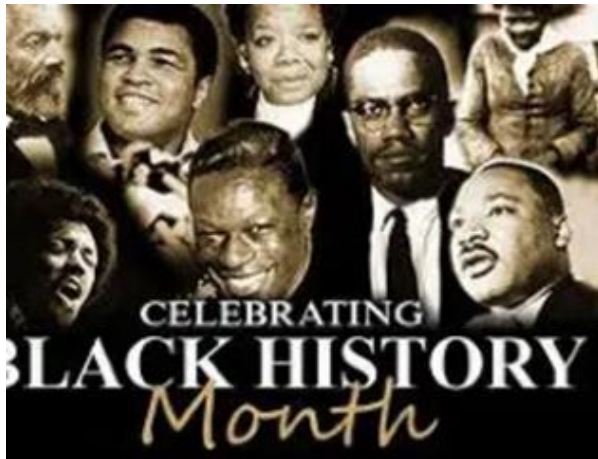

Happy 100th Birthday!



This year marks the 100th anniversary of federal recognition for Black Americans. This began as a singular week of learning and recognition called Negro History Week in 1926, and has grown into a cultural observance of Black History throughout the month of February.

The architect of this movement was Dr. Carter G. Woodson. A historian and educator, he also holds the distinction of being the second African American to receive a Ph.D. from Harvard University, following W.E.B. Du Bois. As the son of formerly enslaved parents, Dr. Woodson understood that denying people of their history denies them of their humanity. Those who have no record of what their forebears have accomplished lose the inspiration which comes from the teaching of biography and history.

To combat that, he launched Negro History Week (NHW) to coincide with the February birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, the two figures whom he felt were symbolically tied to African American freedom.

The idea for a Black History Month was first conceived by this historian Carter G. Woodson and members of his Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (now the Association for the Study of African American Life and History). Together they organized a



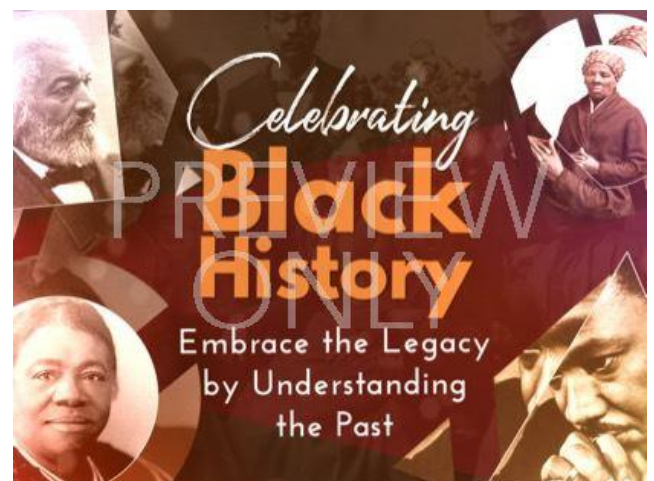
Negro History Week, beginning in February 1926. During the next 50 years Negro History Week grew in popularity, with American cities initiating their own celebrations of Black achievements, and with teachers particularly in schools with a large percentage of African American students using class time to discuss contributions to history made by notable African Americans. The civil rights movement also contributed to its popularity. Negro History Week was expanded to become Black History Month in 1976, with United States President Gerald Ford urging Americans to participate in its observance.

At the beginning of the 21st century, Black History Month was celebrated with a range of events at public schools, universities, and museums as well as within individual communities across the country.

For 40 years, educators embraced it, churches amplified it, and civic groups-built programs around it. In the 1960s, as the Civil Rights Movement emerged, NHW became more reflective of the urgency of a nation struggling with its conscience.

By 1976, the United States formally expanded the week-long recognition into Black History Month with the essence of Woodson's vision remaining unchanged: Black history is not a sidebar to American history - it is part of history.

Interesting Black History Month Facts



In honor of Black History Month, here are some facts about Black history in America that even history buffs may not know. Each February, the United States observes Black History Month, a monthlong celebration that honors the contributions made by Black Americans. During this time, people support Black-owned businesses, share powerful Black History Month quotes and research **Black History Month facts** to educate themselves on groundbreaking people, places and events.

A historian helped establish Black History Month - Here's a [Black American](#)



you may not have learned about in school: Historian Carter G. Woodson, the creator of what we presently know as Black History Month, worked passionately to establish the event in an effort to provide an education on the origins, struggles and achievements of African Americans in United States history. Originally, it existed as seven days of commemoration, first established in 1926 and called "Negro History Week." Woodson penned more than a dozen books, including 1933's, *The Mis-Education of the Negro*.

Black History Month is observed during different months around the world

This may be one of those Black History Month facts that's new to you. The United States, Canada and Germany observe Black History Month in February. However, in the United Kingdom, Ireland and the Netherlands, they honor it during the month of October.



Black History Month has been nationally recognized since 1976 - Despite its forerunner, Negro History Week, originating all the way back in 1926, Black History Month as we know it today didn't become nationally recognized until the 1970s. Black students and educators at Kent State first [celebrated Black](#)

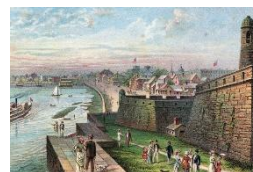
[History Month](#) in January and February of 1970. Other educational institutions started following suit, and for the United States Bicentennial, President Gerald Ford recognized Black History Month, as has every president since.



The founding of the NAACP coincides with Black History Month - On Feb. 12, 2024, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) will celebrate its 115th birthday. The date of Feb. 12, 1909, was chosen for the NAACP's inception because it also marked the 100th birthday of Abraham Lincoln and coincided with abolitionist Fredrick Douglass's birthday, on Feb. 14. As one of the most interesting Black history facts, the NAACP is America's oldest civil rights organization, as well as its largest.



The practice of vaccination in America has interesting roots - An enslaved person by the name of Onesimus, brought to the Massachusetts colony, told church minister Cotton Mather about the way inoculations were practiced in Africa for centuries to prevent people from getting sick. Mather took this information to Dr. Zabdiel Boylston when smallpox became a severe issue in Boston in 1721, reports History.com. Boylston inoculated more than 240 people, despite a large opposition to the practice.



Fort Mose is an important town in Black history - Of all the cities you learned about in school that no longer exist, Fort Mose (pronounced "Mo-say") is one of the most important. Here's one of the little-known Black history facts: More than 250 years ago, when people who had escaped their enslavement made their way to St. Augustine, Florida, they were welcomed by the Spanish, who valued their skills and contributions. In 1738, the governor rewarded them by establishing the town that went on to become known as Fort Mose. It was the first officially sanctioned town for freed Black men in what is now the United States, with a population of about 100. In 1763, the Fort was

ceded to the British under the Treaty of Paris, and the free Black residents were evacuated to Cuba with the Spanish. The British then destroyed the site during the War of 1812. Today, it is a Historic State Park, making it one of the wonderful [American landmarks that celebrates Black culture](#).

The first state to abolish slavery was in New England -



Considering [President Abraham Lincoln](#) hailed from Illinois and was the president who would eventually abolish slavery, you might expect

that the first state to do away with the practice was his Midwestern state of origin. However, it was Vermont that led the way, in 1777.

James McCune Smith was the first African American doctor -



James McCune Smith was the first African American to hold a medical degree and the first

African American to run a pharmacy. Because no American university was willing to admit him, he was forced to travel to Scotland to earn his degree from the University of Glasgow. After graduating in 1837, he practiced medicine for nearly two decades at the Colored Orphan Asylum in Manhattan, contributed papers to scholarly journals and was widely respected as an intellectual. He was an abolitionist who helped enslaved people escape and find their way to freedom via the Underground Railroad. Despite his accomplishments, Smith was never admitted into the American Medical Association.

The first public high school for African Americans opened in 1870 -



The first public high school for African Americans, Paul Laurence Dunbar High, opened

in Washington, DC, in 1870, just five years after the end of the Civil War. Named after Dunbar, the acclaimed Black writer, the school graduated many luminaries, including the first Black Army General, the first Black presidential cabinet member and the first Black graduate of the Naval Academy. Many high schools, including Dunbar

Vocational High School in Chicago (pictured), have also adopted Dunbar's name.



Black men had a strong presence in the Wild West -

You'd be hard-pressed to find much diversity in old-time Western films; however,

according to *Smithsonian Magazine*, one in four cowboys was Black. In fact, it's believed that the fictional character of the Lone Ranger was based on Bass Reeves. Reeves was born into slavery, but he fled westward during the Civil War. In time, he became a Deputy U.S. Marshal.

George Edwin Taylor ran for president in 1904



Long before Barack Obama became the first Black president of the United States, George Edwin Taylor ran for president in 1904 as a member of the National Negro Liberty Party.

Though the journalist and newspaper editor received only 2,000 votes, Taylor deserves to be remembered for his groundbreaking political run.



Jackie Robinson broke baseball barriers -

On April 15, 1947, Jackie Robinson played in his first game as one of the

Brooklyn Dodgers. During his first season in the major leagues, he led the National League with the most stolen bases and then was honored as Rookie of the Year. Despite his talent and skill, Robinson faced adversity from fans and colleagues; he later became an outspoken member of the Civil Rights Movement for Black equality.

Charlotta Bass paved the way for Kamala Harris



A major glass ceiling and racial milestone was broken in November 2020 when [Kamala Harris](#), the

daughter of Jamaican and

Indian immigrants, was elected as America's first Black vice president (as well as the first woman and South Asian American to hold the

office!). She was not the first Black woman to run for that office, however. In 1948, a journalist named Charlotta Bass became the vice-presidential nominee of the Progressive Party, with Vincent Hallinan as her running mate. She was also from Harris's home state of California!



Sister Rosetta Tharpe knew how to rock - When it comes to rock 'n' roll, the boys seem to get all the credit—but Sister Rosetta

Tharpe was known as the “Godmother of Rock ‘n’ Roll” for a reason. Born in 1915, Tharpe blazed a musical trail with her distinctive voice and rollicking guitar, combining both secular and spiritual music in her own unique brand of rock. Greats like Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan and Johnny Cash have credited her influence on their music.



Quincy Jones, the Grammy-nominated music man, made history - Quincy Jones hits the history books as the most nominated artist

in Grammy history. He has scored a total of 80 nominations and 28 awards. Not surprisingly, he was presented with the Grammy Legend Award back in 1992. Jones is also one of the founders of the Institute for Black American Music.

Claudette Colvin pre-dated Rosa Parks in



refusing to give up her seat on public transportation - Many people learn about Rosa Parks fighting for desegregation on a Montgomery, Alabama, bus, but they may not know this Black

history fact: Claudette Colvin, a young girl, did it before Parks. In 1955, at just 15 years old, she stayed seated and refused to move to the back of the bus for a white passenger. She was subsequently arrested. According to NPR, Colvin had learned about the plight of Harriet Tubman and other early activists in school before her arrest.



Wilma Rudolph was a pioneering Olympian and activist - Wilma Rudolph was an African American

athlete who became the [first woman to win](#) three medals at the Summer Olympics in 1960. Having achieved her dream, she returned home and refused to participate in a celebratory parade if it was segregated. As a result, the parade and banquet thrown in her honor were the first events to be integrated in her hometown of Clarksville, Tennessee.



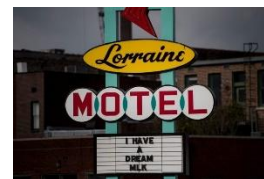
Interracial marriage was banned in the U.S. until 1967 - Way back in 1664, marriage between races was banned in the United States.

This law was first enacted in the Colony of Maryland, with others quickly following suit. It might seem surprising today that this took more than 300 years to overturn—but it's less unbelievable when you understand the full depth of [institutional racism](#) and what it means.

Civil rights solidarity in sports has deep roots



Many years before Colin Kaepernick took a knee during the national anthem, two other athletes sent a powerful message about their unity with Black America. During the 1968 Olympic games in Mexico City, competitors Tommie Smith and John Carlos wore black gloves and gave a [Black power salute during the anthem](#).



The National Civil Rights Museum is in a somber location -

Everyone should visit the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, Tennessee, an immersive experience, steeped in history and emotion. The museum itself is located on the former site of the Lorraine Motel, where [Martin Luther King Jr.](#) was tragically assassinated. The facade is still there to remind visitors of what happened that day.



Martin Luther King Jr.'s assassination coincided with an icon's birthday - It was on [Maya Angelou's](#) 40th birthday, April 4, 1968, that her friend, civil rights activist Martin

Luther King Jr., was assassinated. After this heinous act, Angelou stopped celebrating her birthday. However, she sent flowers to King's wife, Coretta Scott King, on that date until Mrs. King passed in 2006.



Students had a big impact on the Civil Rights Movement - When we think of the heroes of the Civil Rights Movement, we usually think of towering figures like Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr., but the movement also comprised ordinary young people who wanted to change the world by fighting injustice.



The first African American woman was elected to the House of Representatives in 1968 - Paving the way for women of color in Congress (and the White House) was Shirley Chisholm, who represented New York in the House of Representatives. Just four years after she entered

the House, in 1972, she became the first Black candidate for a major party's nomination in the race for president of the United States.
