What We Believe

The Articles of Faith in the Baptist Church

- **I. The Scriptures.** We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us, and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions shall be tried.
- **II.** The True God. We believe the Scriptures teach that there is one, and only one, living and true God, an infinite, intelligent Spirit, whose name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of heaven and earth; inexpressibly glorious in holiness, and worthy of all possible honor confidence and love; that in the unity of the Godhead there are three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every divine perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.
- III. The Fall of Man. We believe the Scriptures teach that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgressions fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.
- **IV.** The Way of Salvation. We believe that the Scriptures teach that the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace; through the mediatorial offices of the Son of God; who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon him our nature, yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and by his death made a full atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all-sufficient Savior.
- **V. Justification.** We believe the Scriptures teach that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in him is justification; that justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through faith in the Redeemer's blood; by virtue of which faith his perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.
- **VI.** The Freeness of Salvation. We believe that the Scriptures teach that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by cordial, penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own determined depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which rejection involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

- VII. Regeneration. We believe that the Scriptures teach that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith, and newness of life.
- VIII. Repentance and Faith. We believe the Scriptures teach that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our prophet, priest and king, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Savior.
- **IX. God's Purpose of Grace.** We believe the Scriptures teach that election is the eternal purpose of God, according to which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of his free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.
- **X. Sanctification.** We believe the Scriptures teach that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the will of God, we are made partakers of his holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means especially the word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer.
- **XI. Perseverance of the Saints.** We believe the Scriptures teach that such only are real believers as endure to the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- XII. The Law and Gospel. We believe the Scriptures teach that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of his moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arise entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible church.
- **XIII.** A Gospel Church. We believe the Scriptures teach that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors, and Deacons whose Qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

XIV. Baptism and the Lord's Supper. We believe the Scriptures teach that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Savior, with its effect, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

XV. The Christian Sabbath. We believe the Scriptures teach that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath, and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public, and by preparation for that rest that remained for the people of God.

XVI. Civil Government. We believe the Scriptures teach that civil government is of divine appointment, for the interest and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the Kings of the earth.

XVII. Righteous and Wicked. We believe the Scriptures teach that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in his esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

XVIII. The World to Come. We believe the Scriptures teach that the end of the world is approaching; that at the last day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave for final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

THE CHURCH COVENANT

Having been led, as we believe by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savior; and, on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, we do now, in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge and holiness; to give place in our affections, prayers, and services above every organization of human origin; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly, as God has prospered us, toward its expenses for the support of a faithful and evangelical ministry among us, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel throughout the world. In case of a difference of opinion in the church, we will strive to avoid a contentious spirit, and if we cannot unanimously agree, we will cheerfully recognize the right of the majority to govern.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotions, to study diligently the Word of God; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be kind and just to those in our employ, and faithful in the service we promise others; endeavoring in the purity of heart and goodwill towards all men to exemplify and commend our holy faith.

We further engage to watch over, to pray for, to exhort and stir up each other unto every good word and work; to guard each other's reputation, not needlessly exposing the infirmity of others; to participate in each other's joys, and with tender sympathy, bear one another's burdens and sorrows; to cultivate Christian courtesy; to be slow to give or take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, being mindful of the rules of the Savior in the eighteenth chapter of Matthew, to secure it without delay; and through life, amid evil report, to seek to live to the glory of God, who hath called us out of darkness into His marvelous light.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and the principles of God's Word.

"The Righteous Live by Faith" Lessons at Glance

February 3rd – "Faith in the Power of God" (Isaiah 40:12-13, 25-31)



NEW COVID HEALTH ADVISORY

Everyone is advised to wear a mask because the new COVID-Omicron XBB variant coronavirus is different, deadly, and not easily detected properly.

Symptoms of the XBB virus are as follows: No cough, No fever.

There will only be joint pain, headache, neck pain, upper back pain, pneumonia, and general loss of appetite.

XBB is 5 times more toxic than the Delta variant and has a higher mortality rate. It takes a shorter time for the condition to reach extreme severity, and sometimes there are no obvious symptoms. This strain of the virus is not found in the nasopharyngeal region (head and neck), and it directly affects the lungs, the "windows," for a relatively short period of time. Nasal swab tests are generally negative for COVID-Omicron and false-negative XBB. cases nasopharyngeal tests are increasing. This means the virus can spread in the community and directly infect lungs, leading to viral pneumonia, which in turn causes acute respiratory stress. XBB has become highly contagious, highly virulent, and lethal.

Avoid crowded places, keep a distance of 1.5m (5 feet.) even in open spaces, wear a double-layer mask, wear a suitable mask, wash hands frequently even when everyone is asymptomatic (no coughing or sneezing). Don't keep this information to yourself; share as much as possible with other relatives and friends, especially yours.

Make Me Rain: Poems and Prose



Better, Not Bitter: Living on Purpose in the Pursuit of Racial Justice by Yusef Salaam



The Unsettled: A novel

From the moment Ava Carson and her ten-year-old son, Toussaint, arrive at the Glenn Avenue family shelter in Philadelphia 1985, Ava is already plotting a way out. She is repulsed by the shelter's squalid conditions: their cockroach-

infested room, the barely edible food, and the shifty night security guard. She is determined to rescue her son from the perils and indignities of that place, and to save herself from the complicated past that led them there.

Ava has been estranged from her own mother, Dutchess, since she left her Alabama home as a young woman barely out of her teens. Despite their estrangement and the thousand miles between them, mother and daughter are deeply entwined, but Ava can't forgive her sharptongued mother whose intractability and bouts of debilitating despair brought young Ava to the outer reaches of neglect and hunger.

Ava wants to love her son differently, better. But when Toussaint's father, Cass, reappears, she is swept off course by his charisma, and the intoxicating power of his radical vision to destroy systems of racial injustice and bring about a bold new way of communal living.

Meanwhile, in Alabama, Dutchess struggles to keep Bonaparte, once a beacon of Black freedom and self-determination, in the hands of its last five Black residents—and away from rapidly encroaching white developers. She fights against the erasure of Bonaparte's venerable history and the loss of the land itself, which she has so arduously preserved as Ava's inheritance.

As Ava becomes more enmeshed with Cass, Toussaint senses the danger simmering all around him—his well-intentioned but erratic mother; the intense, volatile figure of his father who drives his fledgling Philadelphia community toward ever-increasing violence and instability. He begins to dream of Dutchess and Bonaparte, his home and birthright, if only he can find his way there.

CANCER FOR LIFE MINISTRY MONTHLY FEATURE

My Cancer Journey: By Brenda Thomas-James



January 2019 did not start off a very good year. My kids' father had passed away suddenly, and I was holding them together, literally. The day before his funeral, I found a lump. I was stunned and I instinctively knew that was not good. I had to

push this to the back of my mind because my children had to be my priority.

February 2019, after a mammogram, an ultrasound, and a biopsy, it was confirmed I had Stage II HER2 positive Breast Cancer. HER2 positive is a very aggressive form of Breast Cancer. It is right behind triple positive Breast Cancer, which is an incredibly hard type of cancer to treat. With an aggressive form of Breast Cancer comes an aggressive treatment. My plan sounded simple, Lumpectomy (to remove the tumor), Chemo followed by radiation, however, it was anything but.

Every two weeks, I would receive a 4-drug cocktail called TCHP for six months. As my Oncologist explained, she had to poison me to save my life. This is what Chemo is to the body, poison.

Chemo did its job on the Cancer but in turn, almost killed me. I ended up in the hospital, suffered three seizures and was in a coma for three days. I woke up in the ICU and had no memory of what happened. When I woke up, the movement I once had was gone. I had no movement in my left arm, and I lost the ability to walk. While in that coma, my family told me the doctors prepared them for my death. After waking up from my coma, my Oncologist came to me with tears in her eyes and said "the cancer may have spread to your brain, and we need to

perform a biopsy". The scar that some of you may see on my forehead extends to the middle of my head because they needed a piece of my brain to confirm if I had brain cancer.

I told my Oncologist I was going to be OK and she just stared at me. Here I was in the ICU telling her I was going to be OK, and while she didn't believe it, I did. I believed God stepped in and saved my life for a reason and I was going to be OK.

After a 6-week hospital stay, and a 6-week stay in rehab, I left rehab with the ability to walk and write again. Along the way of my journey, I had what I called my 3 F's: my Faith, my Family, and my Friends.

I tell my story in hopes to help others, to remove the stigma of cancer and to inspire others who may be sitting and suffering in silence. God is a miracle worker; this I know to be true.

CNN Hero: Man Helps Barbers Fill Their Shops with Books to Help Kids Find Excitement in Reading



One day in the Bronx, a first-grade teacher sat down in a barbershop for a trim and one of his students walked in, sat

down, and started looking antsy. He thought to himself that it was a perfect opportunity to practice reading, a thought that changed Alvin Irby's life, and in five years' time, he's filling dozens of barbershops around the country with free books to trim back childhood illiteracy.

His non-profit, <u>Barbershop Books</u>, has delivered 50,000 free books to more than 200 barbershops in predominantly black neighborhoods in 24 states, leveraging the fact that in Black American communities, barbershops are like community centers where people congregate naturally.

"Barbershop Books inspires Black boys and other vulnerable children to read for fun," Irby told CNN, which recently honored the man as a CNN Hero. "We install a child-friendly reading space in the barbershop."

Key to the reading spaces are bookshelves that display the covers of the books rather than the spines, helping kids who may be interested in reading seize the opportunity for themselves, whether they're in the barber's chair or they're waiting on their dad or friend. Irby teaches the barbers in all the shops how to help encourage kids to read, such as by asking if they like to read, or what they think about one of the books in the shop. The barbers are key for another reason as well.

"We are putting books in a male-centered space," Irby told CNN. "Less than 2% of teachers are Black males and many Black boys are raised by single moms. Black boys don't see Black men reading."

At heart, the idea is not just about enriching a child's mind but improving their proficiency in school, where Irby who teaches kindergarten and first grade says is pretty much the only place kids see reading happening. He says that if the only time a kid practices piano is at the piano lesson, his progress is going to be really, really slow.

At the moment, he's developing a school curriculum addition to help students identify their own reading preferences. Keeping the theme within Black culture, the program is called "Reading So Lit."

Helping pre-K to 5 students explore, understand, and articulate their reading preferences increases self-awareness and social awareness, and Reading So Lit uses self-assessments and AI to generate actionable, strengths-based data about the reading content and conditions that students find personally meaningful and engaging. It's already been successfully trialed in schools.

As sophisticated as the program is, Irby's passion is still derived from interactions like the one which started it all—the kind that take place in the barbershop.

Interesting Black History Month Facts You May Not Know

In honor of Black History Month, here are some facts about Black history in America that even history buffs may not know. Each February, the United States observes Black History Month, a monthlong celebration that honors the contributions made by Black Americans. During this time, people support Blackowned businesses, share powerful Black History Month quotes and research Black

History Month facts to educate themselves on groundbreaking people, places and events.

We may understand what Black History Month is about, but how much do we really know about this annual event and those it honors? From the historian who established it to the different themes each year, here are some Black History Month facts, along with little-known Black history facts your schools might have left out.

A historian helped establish Black History Month



Here's a <u>Black American</u> you may not have learned about in school: Historian Carter G. Woodson, the creator of what we presently know as Black History Month, worked passionately to establish the event in an effort to provide an education on the origins, struggles and achievements of African Americans in United States history. Originally, it existed as seven days of commemoration, first established in 1926 and called

"Negro History Week." Woodson penned more than a dozen books, including 1933's, *The Mis-Education of the Negro*.

Black History Month has been nationally recognized since 1976



Despite its forerunner, Negro History Week, originating all the way back in 1926, Black History Month as we know it today didn't become nationally recognized until the 1970s. Black students and educators at Kent State first <u>celebrated Black History Month</u> in January and February of 1970. Other educational institutions started following suit, and for the United States Bicentennial, President Gerald Ford

recognized Black History Month, as has every president since.

Black History Month is observed during different months around the world

This may be one of those Black History Month facts that's new to you. The United States, Canada and Germany observe Black History Month in February. However, in the United Kingdom, Ireland and the Netherlands, they honor it during the month of October.

The founding of the NAACP coincides with Black History Month



On Feb. 12, 2024, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) will celebrate its 115th birthday. The date of Feb. 12, 1909, was chosen for the NAACP's inception because it also marked the 100th birthday of Abraham Lincoln and coincided with abolitionist Fredrick Douglass's birthday, on Feb. 14. As one of the most interesting Black history facts, the NAACP is America's oldest civil

rights organization, as well as its largest.

The practice of vaccination in America has interesting roots



An enslaved person by the name of Onesimus, brought to the Massachusetts colony, told church minister Cotton Mather about the way inoculations were practiced in Africa for centuries to prevent people from getting sick. Mather took this information to Dr. Zabdiel Boylston when smallpox became a severe issue in Boston in 1721, reports History.com. Boylston inoculated more than 240 people, despite a large

opposition to the practice.

Fort Mose is an important town in Black history



Of all the cities you learned about in school that no longer exist, Fort Mose (pronounced "Mo-say") is one of the most important. Here's one of the little-known Black history facts: More than 250 years ago, when people who had escaped their enslavement made their way to St. Augustine, Florida, they were welcomed by the Spanish, who valued their skills and contributions. In 1738, the governor rewarded

them by establishing the town that went on to become known as Fort Mose.

It was the first officially sanctioned town for freed Black men in what is now the United States, with a population of about 100. In 1763, the Fort was ceded to the British under the Treaty of Paris, and the free Black residents were evacuated to Cuba with the Spanish. The British then destroyed the site during the War of 1812. Today, it is a Historic State Park, making it one of the wonderful American landmarks that celebrates Black culture.

The first state to abolish slavery was in New England



Considering <u>President Abraham Lincoln</u> hailed from Illinois and was the president who would eventually abolish slavery, you might expect that the first state to do away with the practice was his Midwestern state of origin. However, it was Vermont that led the way, in 1777.

James McCune Smith was the first African American doctor



James McCune Smith was the first African American to hold a medical degree and the first African American to run a pharmacy. Because no American university was willing to admit him, he was forced to travel to Scotland to earn his degree from the University of Glasgow.

After graduating in 1837, he practiced medicine for nearly two decades at the Colored Orphan Asylum in Manhattan, contributed papers to scholarly journals and was widely respected as an intellectual. He was an abolitionist who helped enslaved people escape and find their way to freedom via the Underground Railroad. Despite his accomplishments, Smith was never admitted into the American Medical Association.

The first public high school for African Americans opened in 1870



The first public high school for African Americans, Paul Laurence Dunbar High, opened in Washington, DC, in 1870, just five years after the end of the Civil War. Named after Dunbar, the acclaimed Black writer, the school graduated many luminaries, including the first Black Army General, the first Black presidential cabinet member and the first Black graduate

of the Naval Academy. Many high schools, including Dunbar Vocational High School in Chicago (pictured above), have also adopted Dunbar's name.

Black men had a strong presence in the Wild West



You'd be hard-pressed to find much diversity in old-time Western films; however, according to *Smithsonian Magazine*, one in four cowboys was Black. In fact, it's believed that the fictional character of the Lone Ranger was based on Bass Reeves. Reeves was born into slavery, but he fled westward during the Civil War. In time, he became a Deputy U.S. Marshal.

George Edwin Taylor ran for president in 1904



Long before Barack Obama became the first Black president of the United States, George Edwin Taylor ran for president in 1904 as a member of the National Negro Liberty Party. Though the journalist and newspaper editor received only 2,000 votes, Taylor deserves to be remembered for his groundbreaking political run.

Jackie Robinson broke baseball barriers



On April 15, 1947, Jackie Robinson played in his first game as one of the Brooklyn Dodgers. During his first season in the major leagues, he led the National League with the most stolen bases and then was honored as Rookie of the Year. Despite his talent and skill, Robinson faced adversity from fans and colleagues; he later became an outspoken member of the Civil Rights Movement for Black equality.

Betty Boop was inspired by a Black jazz singer



She may have been drawn as an old Hollywood pinup girl, but cartoon Betty Boop was actually based on Esther Jones, a Harlem-based jazz singer. Jones was known for her use of "boops" in her singing as well as what was called a child-like scat, similar to that of her illustrated counterpart.

Charlotta Bass paved the way for Kamala Harris



A major glass ceiling and racial milestone was broken in November 2020 when <u>Kamala Harris</u>, the daughter of Jamaican and Indian immigrants, was elected as America's first Black vice president (as well as the first woman and South Asian American to hold the office!). She was not the first Black woman to run for that office, however. In 1948, a journalist named Charlotta Bass became the vice-

presidential nominee of the Progressive Party, with Vincent Hallinan as her running mate. She was also from Harris's home state of California!

Sister Rosetta Tharpe knew how to rock



When it comes to rock 'n' roll, the boys seem to get all the credit—but Sister Rosetta Tharpe was known as the "Godmother of Rock 'n' Roll" for a reason. Born in 1915, Tharpe blazed a musical trail with her distinctive voice and rollicking guitar, combining both secular and spiritual music in her own unique brand of rock. Greats like Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley, Bob Dylan and Johnny Cash have credited her

influence on their music.

Quincy Jones, the Grammy-nominated music man, made history



Quincy Jones hits the history books as the most nominated artist in Grammy history. He has scored a total of 80 nominations and 28 awards. Not surprisingly, he was presented with the Grammy Legend Award back in 1992. Jones is also one of the founders of the Institute for Black American Music.

Claudette Colvin pre-dated Rosa Parks in refusing to give up her seat on public transportation



Many people learn about Rosa Parks fighting for <u>desegregation</u> on a Montgomery, Alabama, bus, but they may not know this Black history fact: Claudette Colvin, a young girl, did it before Parks. In 1955, at just 15 years old, she stayed seated and refused to move to the back of the bus for a white passenger. She was subsequently arrested. According to NPR, Colvin had learned about the plight of Harriet Tubman and other early activists in school before her arrest.

Wilma Rudolph was a pioneering Olympian and activist



Wilma Rudolph was an African American athlete who became the <u>first woman to win</u> three medals at the Summer Olympics in 1960. Having achieved her dream, she returned home and refused to participate in a celebratory parade if it was segregated. As a result, the parade and banquet thrown in her honor were the first events to be integrated in her hometown of Clarksville, Tennessee.

Interracial marriage was banned in the U.S. until 1967



Way back in 1664, marriage between races was banned in the United States. This law was first enacted in the Colony of Maryland, with others quickly following suit. It might seem surprising today that this took more than 300 years to overturn—but it's less unbelievable when you understand the full depth of <u>institutional racism</u> and what it means.

Civil rights solidarity in sports has deep roots



Many years before Colin Kaepernick took a knee during the national anthem, two other athletes sent a powerful message about their unity with Black America. During the 1968 Olympic games in Mexico City, competitors Tommie Smith and John Carlos wore black gloves and gave a Black power salute during the anthem.

The National Civil Rights Museum is in a somber location



Everyone should visit the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, Tennessee, an immersive experience, steeped in history and emotion. And it's not only the artifacts the museum houses that are notable. The museum itself is located on the former site of the Lorraine Motel, where <u>Martin Luther King Jr.</u> was tragically assassinated. The facade is still there to remind visitors of what happened that day.

Noelle Trent, PhD, Director of Interpretations, Collections and Education at the museum, tells *Reader's Digest*, "The preservation of historic sites, especially the Lorraine Motel, is important because the physical structures, space and geography interpret history in a manner that cannot be expressed by words or photographs. There is power in a place."

Martin Luther King Jr.'s assassination coincided with an icon's birthday



It was on <u>Maya Angelou</u>'s 40th birthday, April 4, 1968, that her friend, civil rights activist Martin Luther King Jr., was assassinated. After this heinous act, Angelou stopped celebrating her birthday. However, she sent flowers to King's wife, Coretta Scott King, on that date until Mrs. King passed in 2006.

Students had a big impact on the Civil Rights Movement



When we think of the heroes of the Civil Rights Movement, we usually think of towering figures like Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr., but the movement also comprised ordinary young people who wanted to change the world by fighting injustice. "Young people have been critical actors in the fight for civil rights in the United States," shares Trent. "From the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee

and the Congress for Racial Equality's Freedom Riders to 1964 Freedom Summer's Council of Federated Organizations, youths were participants and leaders in key protest movements. They leveraged their innovative techniques to work within the community to challenge the status quo."

The first African American woman was elected to the House of Representatives in 1968



Paving the way for women of color in Congress (and the White House) was Shirley Chisolm, who represented New York in the House of Representatives. Just four years after she entered the House, in 1972, she became the first Black candidate for a major party's nomination in the race for president of the United States.

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



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
